

Countdown to Lent ② ① ② ②

The English word *Lent* comes from the Old English *lencten* and literally refers to the lengthening of the daylight hours that occurs in the spring. Lent begins on March 1st with the 12:30 p.m. Ash Wednesday mass and distribution of ashes. What does God want of you this year during this Lenten time?

During Lent, we have the opportunity to spend time accounting for our thoughts and actions — 6 weeks to plumb our spiritual depth to see where we stand and how we respond to God's call to us.

The church calls us to the spiritual disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving especially during this time. We are called as individuals, and as a community, to support each other in these exercises. Now is a good time to make a concrete plan for our Lenten practices.

First Spiritual Exercises — A Lenten Retreat

Learn the beginnings of the Ignatian Spiritual Exercises in a four-week retreat in daily life. The **First Spiritual Exercises** were created to help a person ask for and receive inner peace. This is a set of prayer exercises, structured in four weeks, with a particular dynamic by St. Ignatius. They are a single, progressive, and powerful experience of grace built around personal prayer at home and guided spiritual direction in a small group.

March 1st — orientation after mass or by appointment

Expectation of personal prayer for four days of the week plus a Sunday "Action" as well as participation in a guided small group spiritual conversation.


