**MOTHER TERESA**

**Witness to Love**

While traveling by train from Calcutta to her Loreto Sisters convent in Darjeeling, India, Mother Teresa had a profound experience. "It was the most important journey of my life," she said. She received "a call within a call" to live among the poorest of the poor. "It was an order." Nearly two years later, she received permission from her superiors to leave the Loreto Sisters and her life of teaching, which she loved, and venture out into the seething slums of Calcutta.

In leaving the Loreto Sisters, Mother Teresa did not feel she had given up her vocation: "Vocation is belonging to Christ. The work is only a means to put our love for Christ into action," she said. Like the poor she sought to aid, she now found herself without money, having to beg for food and supplies. Inspired by her self-sacrifice, young women who had been her former students soon joined her, laying the foundations for her new congregation. In 1950 the Vatican gave approval for Mother Teresa to start the Missionaries of Charity.

The congregation's first Home for the Dying began in the Kali temple in Kalighat. Poor people dying in the streets of Calcutta were brought to the home so that they could die in dignity and according to the rituals of their faith; Muslims were read the Qu'ran, Hindus received water from the Ganges, and Catholics received the Last Rights.

Today Mother Teresa's order operates in more than 100 countries, caring for the very people she had dedicated herself to, as well as victims of floods, epidemics and famine. Before she died in 1997, she had been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for her life of service. She was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 2003 and canonized by Pope Francis on September 4, 2016.



St. Teresa of Calcutta's feast day is September 5th.
