CHAPEL CONFIGURATION FOR LENT:

By the solemn forty days of Lent the Church unites herself each year to the mystery of Jesus in the desert (CCC 540). When we gather on Sunday, we sometimes forget that there are two Tables:

The configuration of the chapel during this Lent lends itself to a purposeful posture of our community as we sit to listen to God's word, and then gather around the altar to participate in the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

- Please find empty chairs in which to sit and use the benches only when the seats have all been occupied.
- Follow the gift bearers and gather around the altar for the Liturgy of the Eucharist.
- Please remain standing throughout the Eucharistic Prayer (paragraph 43 of the GIRM) and make a profound bow when the priest genuflects
- For the sake of uniformity of posture, indicating unity of the community, please remain standing throughout the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

WOMEN AT THE HEART OF CHANGE

BETTY WILLIAMS AND MAIREAD MAGUIRE

Witnesses to Peace

Joint recipients of the 1976 Nobel Peace Prize, Williams and Maguire, along with journalist Ciaran MacKeown, co-founded The Community for Peace People to advocate for an end to “the Troubles” in Northern Ireland.

The women met shortly after a day when British troops shot and killed an Irish Republican Army terrorist who was fleeing in a car. The car went out of control, striking several people and killing three young siblings. Williams immediately began circulating petitions in Protestant neighbourhoods calling for an end to sectarian violence. Within two days she had obtained 6,000 signatures and gained media attention.

Mairead Corrigan Maguire, the dead siblings’ aunt, joined with Maguire to organize a peace march to the graves of the children, which was attended by 10,000 Protestant and Catholic women. It was disrupted by members of the IRA who accused Williams and Maguire of being “dupes of the British.” Undeterred, the following week the two women led a second march, this time with 35,000 people attending.

In 1997 Williams founded the World Centers of Compassion for Children International to create a political voice for children living in areas of stress caused by war, hunger, or upheaval. Maguire continued to lead the Peace People and is a voice for peace, nonviolence, justice, and human rights globally, advocating “no to war and yes to dialogue and negotiations.”

In 2006 both women, along with other female Nobel laureates founded the Nobel Women’s Initiative. They continue to advocate for women in particular to stand against violence. Williams says to women:
